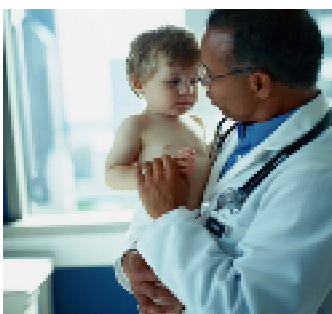
Directions for Immigrants offers Study Groups for Immigrant Physicians

On January 23 and February 2, 2010, Directions for Immigrants will be offering Study Groups for the Medical Council of Canada Qualifying Examination (MCCQE) Part I and the Qualifying Examination (MCCQE) Part II – OSCE (Objective Structured Clinical Exam).

Cayti Beyer, Career Coach, shared with us what it has been like to develop these study groups.

What elements have you taken into account when designing these study groups?

From a focus group we held with International Medical Graduate (IMG) residents and IMGs at different levels of the licensing process, I received great feedback that will help with content planning and identifying areas of difficulty in the MCC exams. Also,



practicing Canadian physicians and senior residents have been consulted in order to ensure a logical and practical approach to the study material.

What aspects of the preparation of these study groups are the most challenging?

It is of utmost importance to have a strong selection of scenario questions which covers all aspects of the exam including ethics, population health, epidemiology, and stats. The MCCQE2 requires many clinical scenarios for each section of the exam. Each case requires a detailed clinical checklist, study group questions and materials and handouts to help facilitate learning.

What benefits participants will gain from these study groups?

The benefit of being facilitated by practicing Canadian physicians and senior residents in a small group setting over a period of weeks is very valuable. Learning in a group



environment which helps to build an understanding of the many cultures found here in Alberta, how to work together as a team, how we negotiate and problem solve as a group are also valuable.

What level of commitment do you expect from participants?

This is a program for professionals, coordinated by professionals, and facilitated by professionals. Participants are expected to attend all sessions and to be on time. My broad outcome expectations for these study groups reflect the ultimate goal of each IMG, which is licensure in Alberta. To achieve that goal requires dedication, hard work, a positive attitude, willingness to learn, strong language and communication skills, and a passion for medicine.

For people in Accounting and Finance check the websites of professional associations such as CA, CGA and CMA.

Don't miss community and ethnic groups' gatherings. These are valuable opportunities to meet new people - concludes Patrick.

to be recognized. Many of our participants struggled between balancing a family, a new culture and workplace, as well as studying for hours each day". Moreover, says Joumana, "the event let us express our gratitude to very supportive co-facilitators such as Linda Shorting and Ariel Banjao".

Some participants also provided feedback on the event. Rhodora Ganje commented, "Meeting successful examinees that had been through the same experience of exam anxiety gave me some relief". Titi Goke expressed, "I felt the people around me were the ones I belong with. They understand the challenge that comes with being new in Canada".
