NPPE Study Groups:

A valuable resource for immigrant engineers seeking licensure

More than 150 internationally educated engineers have benefited from Directions for Immigrants' National Professional Practice Examination (NPPE) study groups.

Engineering is a regulated profession in Alberta which means no one can call himself/herself an engineer without a license. Immigrant engineers and geoscientists will have more opportunities to practice in their field if they complete the licensing application process with the Association of Professional Engineers, Geologists and Geophysicists of Alberta (APEGGA). An important starting point of licensure is passing the NPPE, a twohour, 100 question, multiple choice examination based on professionalism, law, and ethics.

From January 2007 to October 2009, Directions for Immigrants completed 17

NPPE study groups of which 80 per cent of participants passed the exam.

Patrick Cotter, career coach and facilitator of the NPPE study group, explains this success: "Our study groups provide participants with study materials, tips on how to summarize content, and the opportunity to discuss Canadian business culture within the engineering field." Patrick adds that the goal of the study group is not to memorize the information but to understand the material through discussion, weekly quizzes, and mock exams, and then apply this knowledge to the NPPE exam.

Oswaldo Ponce, an internationally trained civil engineer from Venezuela, passed the NPPE last year after having completed Directions' NPPE study group. Ponce stresses the importance of completing mock exams. "Weekly quizzes ensured that key engineering concepts that are part of the NPPE were covered", he said.

Wilfredo de Vera, electronics Communications engineer from the Philippines,




is planning to write this April.

About the study group methodology he said: "It somehow 'forces' and disciplines me to study. Reading an average of five chapters a week and being able to present assigned chapters is like doing workouts at the gym."

The NPPE study groups are facilitated by career coaches who utilize APEGGA resources, have experience in adult education, and a general understanding of the subject matter. A co-facilitator, who is working in the field of engineering, supports the study group by discussing and clarifying more technical concepts.

The 12 week NPPE study group sessions are offered four times a year. The next NPPE study groups will start on April 23 (Fridays) and April 24 (Saturdays).

Clients of Directions for Immigrants have the opportunity to obtain practical tactics for their job search through our recently re-launched *Networking* and *Job Leads* workshops.

Joan Matsusaki, career coach and facilitator, says that this workshop series helps clients move forward with their job search. She adds: "Clients are given practical assignments such as find a networking group

Matsusaki says that immediate feedback on job search activities is provided and some participants' successes motivate others to try the techniques themselves.

One of the participants, Yu-Chen Hsiao, an internationally educated nurse from Taiwan, believes this workshop provides participants with the opportunity to share successful job search tactics and experiences. Yu-Chen says: "A key benefit was learning how to properly contact people and approach them in a professional way to obtain the information I need."

Vijay Panchmatia, a supply chain logistics professional from India, says that through this workshop, he realized the importance of developing interview skills. Vijay points out: "In past interviews I answered questions enumerating my abilities. In this workshop I learned to prepare and deliver my answers from the perspective of the employer and highlight my qualifications in a way that does not sound arrogant."

Panchmatia adds that after making changes to his resume following the facilitator's advice, three employers called him for phone interviews. Finally, Vijay Panchmatia mentions the networking assignments allowed him to learn the best and most effective practices of networking.

Nurses Study Group started in Red Deer

In an effort to progressively put in place resources and services for internationally educated health professionals in Southern Alberta, Directions for Immigrants started a Canadian Registered Nurses Exam (CRNE) study group in Red Deer on February 24th. A total of 6 participants from the Philippines and England are attending weekly classes at the Red Deer Regional Hospital Centre to review nursing materials and develop test taking skills that will help them succeed in the June 2010 CRNE exam.
